STEWARDSHIP

In June 1992 dignitaries from various countries of the world held the largest Earth Summit ever in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Issues were discussed pertaining to the care and protection of the environment on a national and global level. This brings to mind just one aspect of stewardship we as Christians must consider. Stewardship, according to Webster's Dictionary, is defined as: "The individual's responsibility to manage his life and property with proper regard to the rights of others." This definition touches on all areas of life which the Bible speaks most clearly about.

I. Personal Observations:

A. Describe areas in life of which you feel Christians are to be stewards?

Identify and explain aspects of yourself which you feel characterize a steward.

B. It seems that every decade since the 1920's has had a changed attitude concerning values and priorities which have affected their concept of stewardship.

1. Discuss this issue with a grandparent or elderly friend. Be prepared to share what you have learned with your peers.

2. How do you think your concept of stewardship compares with that of generations before you?

II. Biblical Precept:

A. Through the Bible, God gives the blueprint for a life of stewardship and the standards by which we must measure ourselves. It gives clear precepts for us to search out and incorporate into our daily life of stewardship.

Locate the Biblical precept concerning stewardship in each of the following passages. (this list is by no means exhaustive)

a. Gen. 1:28-30

b. Deut. 8:18

c. Prov. 20:13

d. Matt. 25:14, 15, 23

e. Luke 12:15-21

B. Based on the passages listed above and others you may think of, explain how proper stewardship must be manifested in the following areas:

1. Relationships (family, work related, peers, dating, marriage, etc.)

2. Personal responsibilities (talents, time, wealth, health, abilities, etc.)

3. Spiritual activities (personal devotions, church involvement, gospel witnessing and presentation)

III. Personal Ambitions:

A. Having considered your concept of stewardship and delved into the Biblical precepts, what is your ambition toward stewardship?

1. Thoughts precede actions, and we are commanded to "bring into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ;" II Cor. 10:5b.

2. The hymn, "Take My Life and Let It Be Consecrated" is helpful in guiding us in our full involvement toward stewardship for the service of Christ.

CHRISTIAN COURTESY

I. What is Christian courtesy?

A. What is courtesy?

1. It is defined as curtsy or courteous behavior.

a. Curtsy is an action which expresses deep respect by bodily action or gesture.

b. Courteous behavior implies the state of having such manners as befit the court of a prince.

2. However, today courtesy has spread out its meaning and it involves all sorts of manners which any man might have.

a. It includes a graciously polite and respectful attitude towards the position or feelings of others.

b. These manners must be performed to all those about us whether they are superior to us or inferior.

B. What then is Christian courtesy?

1. Does it differ from secular courtesy?

a. Do Christians perform more courteous actions?

b. Do the Christian deeds of courtesy come from the heart and the secular deeds of courtesy are only done for outward show?

2. How does courtesy become Christian?

a. Is our courtesy Christian before we are regenerated?

b. Can we really show a graciously polite and respectful attitude towards someone else's position or feelings?

3. Was Christ very courteous in His actions?

a. What about His actions toward the scribes and Pharisees? (confer Matt. 23, Mark 7:5-13, Matt. 22:15-22)

b. What about some of His actions to His own people and followers? (confer Luke

10:38-42, Matt. 15:21-28)

c. Did not Christ show respect and was He not polite only to those who served Him?

d. How must our courteous behavior be in comparison to Christ's?

II. What is the basis for our Christian courtesy?

A. Must the Christian pattern his courtesy after the many manners of the secular realms?

1. Must we confer with the books of proper behavior and courtesy?

2. Must we base our courtesy upon the ideas and thought of Ann Landers or any other person who is an expert on proper behavior?

3. Is it really important that the children learn proper deeds of courtesy while they are at home and in school?

B. Rather we must believe that the child of God must go to the Bible in order to see how his behavior must be.

1. What does the Bible say?

a. Concerning the bodily actions that we apply to courtesy or politeness the Bible has several instances where men performed courteous actions toward their friends or neighbors.

b. Read Genesis 18:1-8 and see how Abraham was courteous.

c. Read Genesis 19:1-3 and see how Lot was courteous.

d. We also can read of rules for eating at a guest's table. (confer Proverbs 23:1, Luke 10:8, I Corinthians 10:27)

e. We can also read in the Bible the different ways of greeting each other and the different salutations which are used. (confer Matt. 26:49, I Sam. 25:23, Mark 5:22, Gen. 19:2, Gen. 43:29, Luke 10:5, Ruth 2:4 and I Cor. 16:21)

f. What must be our attitude towards

all of these passages and is this enough that we do these outward acts only?

2. There are also some good passages which might serve as good basis for all of our deeds of courtesy.

a. We have Jesus' words in Matthew 13:12.

b. We have Jesus' parable of the exaltation of the humble in Luke 14:7-11.

c. There are also Christ's words in Matthew 5:38-47, which tell us to do good unto our neighbors and our enemies.

d. There are Paul's words in Galatians 6:9-10 where we are admonished to do good to all men.

e. There are many more texts but these texts are good foundations for all of our deeds of courtesy.

3. But when all is said and done are not all of our acts of courtesy and politeness dependent upon the sum of the law and the prophets which Jesus gave to us in Matthew 22:37-40?

a. If we are to show courtesy and respect toward others must we not first of all fear and love God?

b. If we are to show courteous deeds to our neighbor must we not love him and esteem him better than ourself (Phil. 2:3, Eph. 5:21, I Peter 5:5)?

c. Read I Peter 3:8-17 and you will see that love first be present in a man if he is to show respect and do courtesy to others.

d. Can we then do courteous things to others without loving that person, and also do the ungodly then perform true and genuine deeds of courtesy?

e. Must we not be very careful to make sure that we examine our motives in our courteous actions?

III. Now we must take a look at our own deeds and see whether we need improvement.

A. What about our actions toward those with whom we come in contact?

1. Do we as citizens show enough respect to our authorities?

a. Do we respect our government because it is more powerful than we are or because we feel that it is instituted by God?

b. Do we show enough respect to our parents, teachers, and ministers and how do we show courtesy to them?

2. Does our courteous action to others proceed from a love and an esteeming of them as better and higher than we are?

a. Do we show this courtesy to even our inferiors, i.e. younger brothers or sisters, friends that are not as talented, etc.?

b. Or are our deeds done so that we look good and virtuous to others?

3. Do we consider our courteous actions as good works which please God?

B. What improvements can we make in our lives?

1. Must we be more friendly to strangers?

a. Do we do as we are commanded in Leviticus 19:34, "But the stranger that dwelleth with you shall be unto you as one born among you, and thou shalt love him as thyself; for ye were strangers in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God."

b. Must we not work more on meeting and greeting strangers?

2. Must we not show more respect to the elderly?

a. I think that we as young people can visit the elderly more often.

b. We can also go to them with questions so that we might obtain some wisdom from them.

Here then is a sure resting-place for the heart. Our lives are neither the product of blind fate nor the result of capricious chance, but every detail of them was ordained from all eternity, and is now ordered by the living and reigning God. Not a hair of our heads can be touched without His permission. "A man's heart deviseth his way: *but the Lord directeth his steps*" (Prov. 16:9). What assurance, what strength, what comfort this should give the real Christian! "My times are in *Thy hand*" (Psa. 31:15). Then let me "*Rest in the Lord, and wait patiently for Him*" (Psa. 37:7).

WAR: AN UNFOLDING OF GOD'S PLAN

You what? You have to go to war! This is a dreaded fear in the heart of a woman at a time when war is ripe. War drags a son away from his mother's tight clutches, leaving her terrified and feeling helpless.

War snatches a husband away from his wife, leaving her frightened and alone, anxious for his return.

Yes, our natural reaction is to tremble and shake at the thought of war and hope it won't happen to us. Jesus shows us however, in Matthew 24:6-7a that war is inevitable and even necessary for the carrying out of God's plan. "And ye shall hear of wars and rumors of wars: see that ye be not troubled: for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom."

Realizing this, how should we as Christians feel and respond toward the recent Gulf War? What was our Christian responsibility toward it? Did we have the right to be there? The Gulf War brought many of these questions to mind as we watched fellow Americans and loved ones go off to take part in the war.

My heart was anxious on the evening of Jan. 17 when radio and TV programming was interrupted to tell us that our nation had engaged itself in war. This was of special concern to me because my husband's brother, Matt, was in the Army, and had recently been stationed in Saudi Arabia. Since he was trained to be a gunner on the Hum-vee, an anti-tank weapon, we knew he was in great danger. We found out later that his position had been changed at the last minute to be a semi-truck driver, transporting airplane and tank fuel into Kuwait and Iraq. We were thankful he was taken out of combat position, but we

knew he was still in danger, carrying a loaded weapon with him at all times. There was nothing we could do for him, except pray, which we did often.

The promises of the Bible give us so much comfort when our loved ones are in areas of potential danger. Psalm 139:9 & 10 tells us, "If I take the wings of the morning and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, even there shall Thy hand lead me, and Thy right hand shall hold me." I knew God was with Matt wherever he went. What a comfort for us to know that our God is everywhere present, and always in control! If we have loved ones in these awful circumstances, we know they are in His care.

While reading the news accounts and hearing the radio reports of the awful things done by Saddam Hussein, it was easy to take on a spirit of revenge. We shouldn't go into war with a vengeful spirit. God tells us in Romans 12:19 "Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord." Instead our attitude should be one of quiet trust in our sovereign God, and a willingness to defend and preserve the welfare of our country.

As citizens we may be called on by our government to fight off an enemy who threatens the welfare of our country. We have the calling to obey our government which God has put over us, knowing that it is a tool in the hand of our Almighty God to accomplish His good pleasure. We must keep in mind, however, that ultimately we serve not our country, or any other earthly institution, but that we serve our living God.

During the 43 days of war in the air and 100 hours of fighting on the ground, we watched in fascination as the war unfolded live on TV. For many of us who have never lived during a time of war, being able to see the weapons of mass

destruction in action made us realize the seriousness of war. In amazement we sat watching buildings being destroyed and lives being lost, all from the comforts of our own homes. All this made me realize how thankful we ought to be that God has given us a country where we enjoy relative peace and quiet.

Does war frighten you? "Be not terrified"


Jesus tells us in Luke 21. Our first reaction to war is fear. Death and destruction seem so horrible to us, but we need not be terrified. Why? Because the Lord Jesus Christ in His infinite wisdom and love for His people, sovereignly controls every event. What a comfort for us to know that above the noise of war, we hear the approaching footsteps of the Lord.

THE FOUR HORSEMEN - AND IRAQ

The four horsemen of Rev. 6:1-8 are familiar, I am sure, to all of our readers. These four horsemen have been running through all of the New Testament age. We see them running not just in one part of the earth, but over the whole of the earth. We have definitely seen them running in the recent war with Iraq—but we hear of their effect in many other nations as well.

Briefly consider the four horsemen. The first rides a white horse. The rider has a bow, and a crown is given to him. The bow indicates the spiritual warfare in which he is engaged; the crown shows that victory is his. He goes forth "conquering and to conquer." This horse with its rider represents the spread of the gospel over all of the earth. Generally, this horse and its rider have traveled from Canaan westward until today virtually all the nations of the world have heard the gospel. By means of this horse and its rider, God has been gathering His people from the whole earth. God does this through the labors of His church to send forth the Word to bring in His elect.

The second horse is red. Its rider has a great sword and is given power to take peace from the earth. This horse represents warfare as this is conducted through the ages. There is killing and destruction. The great sword shows this. The horse portrays what is obvious: throughout history there have been wars and rumors of wars (Matt. 24:6)

The third horse is black and its rider has in his hands a pair of balances. He is to measure out the barley and wheat but is instructed not to touch the oil and wine. Black portrays famine. The measure of the necessary grain for breads pictures the fact that many receive only the barest essentials. A "penny" is a day's wages which could purchase only enough grain for one day. The "wine and oil" reminds of the luxury in which the rich revel. While the poor suffer and die of famine, the rich continue to enjoy their

prosperity and abundance. This horse too can be observed as he runs through all nations and in all ages.

The final horse is "pale," i.e. a pale green. Its rider is identified as "Death." Hell follows after. The color of the horse is the color of death. The rider indicates also that we have set forth here the deaths which occur over all of the world and through all of time. None live forever. All must die and enter "hell" (which in this instance refers to the grave)

Concerning these four horses, let it be noted that they are part of the seven seals (followed by seven trumpets and then by seven vials) The seals (and horses) affect one fourth of the whole earth (trumpets affect one third, and the vials affect the whole). These represent the average—that destruction which is seen and heard throughout the history of the world.

One other fact ought to be noted. In each instance the horses with their riders are called forth "Come" (not "Come and see" as the KJV) One of the four beasts gives the command. That these go forth is, therefore, under the direction of God and at His command. This is true not only for the first horse, the preaching of the gospel. The other horses as well go forth at His command. There is not war, famine, death by accident—but this is under God's Sovereign control. We must remember that when we hear of those things which take place about us today.

About a year ago we were fascinated with the "Gulf war" that took place in Iraq. We heard of and saw the bombings—some directed with pin-point accuracy. We were amazed by the 100-hour battle in which the Iraqi positions were overrun. We could hardly understand the minimal amount of casualties that "our side" sustained.

The horses of Rev. 6 were running in Iraq. It is true that they are always running through the whole New Testament time. But we

saw them run, shown in living color on television, when Iraq was defeated. We ought to have been fascinated not so much by the modern inventions used in warfare as by the fact that God's Word was being fulfilled.

The first horse had run his course through that region many generations ago. The gospel had been proclaimed in Iraq and neighboring areas as well. There are, so we are told, churches and Christians in the land—though these consist of only a small percentage of the population.

The last three horses were (and are) running there in the service of the white horse which continues to run through the nations of the earth today.

The course of the last three horses is clearly seen in Iraq. War was carried out there with a vengeance. Hundreds of thousands, civilians and soldiers, were evidently killed. The final count has never been released. The red horse ran through Iraq.

The black horse is running there even now. We hear of reports of scarcities brought on by the war and by the oppressive regime of Iraq. There is an embargo upon trade with Iraq. The reports that come out of that land indicate that the citizens continue to suffer greatly. However, those in power live in luxury. Clearly the "wine and oil" are not hurt there. We are even told that the present embargo helps Hussein to remain in power—because the general populace are too

poor and weak to rebel or object.

The pale green horse continues to run in Iraq too. Death has been seen there in all of its awfulness. There are the war deaths not only, but now those brought on by shortages of many vital materials.

One might even wonder if what is seen in Iraq does not indicate that we have an increase of all of these adversities from the fourth to the third mentioned in Rev. 8ff.

These horses are not only running in Iraq. We hear daily of their effect in Africa with its wars, famines, and drought. We hear of it in Yugoslavia and in the former U.S.S.R.

All of this tells us something. The message to the Christian is not that the U.S. is now the supreme power in the world—victor in the "cold war". FROM THE PASTOR'S STUDY

DRIFTING WITH THE WIND (2)

Last time we considered the awesome truth that Satan is feverishly striving to get us to drift away from the truth of God's word, and to believe his false doctrines, which deny God His glory. He hates God and is constantly striving to get us to hate Him. And that is a terrible truth that we must not overlook.

The wind of Satan, that is, his false doctrine, turns us away from God and make us concerned with fleshly, sinful advantages. He, as we saw last time, strives to get us to drift down to where there is a waterfall that brings us away from the love of the truth that brings us to The Haven Of Rest, where we will live with God forever in a covenant fellowship and holy life. Satan hates those who love God, and he wants them to go to hell! Yes, he wants that because he hates God.

Last time we considered the devilish work of Satan in Arminianism, which teaches that we must open our hearts, and let Christ come in us with salvation. We must make the decision, which will move God and let Him save us. And although some may claim that God is almighty, they nevertheless, as guided by Satan, also teach that we have to let Christ come into our hearts. Mind you, Young People, that not only denies the truth we considered last time, namely, that God told Adam that he would die spiritually, if he ate of the forbidden fruit; but it also teaches that God has to wait for what spiritually dead people

do and are called to do.

It certainly is true that our almighty God presents through the apostle John, and in Revelation 3:20, the truth that Christ stands at the door of the church at Laodicea and knocks; and that if they open the door, He will come in to be with them. But that truth is corrupted when the Arminian churches teach that Christ is here knocking on the door of the hearts of those in this church, and is waiting to see whether they will open the door of their hearts and let Him come in. Mind you, it teaches that spiritually dead people can open their hearts and let Christ come in to them!

The undeniable fact in this verse is that the heart of man is not mentioned in this letter to the Laodiceans. It is not even suggested in that letter presented in Revelation 3:14-22. Christ is standing at the door of THE CHURCH AT LAODICEA, not at the door of the heart of anyone in that church. Christ is standing outside of that church, because it no longer presents Him in its preaching. O yes, they mentioned His name many a time; and they loudly call themselves Christians. BUT our God, here in this letter to this church, presents the awesome fact that not Christ, but the antichrist is being preached there. And the believing children of God in that church are called to get Christ back in the preaching, and expel those that preach an

antichrist, who they claim promises a wonderful life in glory; but does not present the wonderful truth of deliverance FROM SIN! That church is neither cold, nor hot. And that means that it did not condemn sin, nor insist on presenting Christ as the blessed Savior Who saves us from SIN! It uses His name, presents His cross as a wonderful thing, because it gets such a wonderful, heavenly life for us. BUT Christ spews this church out of His mouth, because they, like Satan did to Eve, come with the doctrine that teaches that they will become gods, that is, will have a richer fleshly life, and are concerned, not with a new spiritual life, but with fleshly enjoyment.

We must be concerned with salvation from SIN, not merely salvation from the punishment sin brings to man. As pointed out last time, our God in that first gospel presentation, in Genesis 3:15, and is called The Mother Promise, speaks of working enmity, that is, hatred against Satan and sin in the hearts of His elect children, whom Satan had brought to the love of sin. God did not in that first promise of salvation present deliverance from the punishment of sin, but from the hatred against Satan and the sin he had brought into mankind. There just cannot be deliverance from punishment until there is for the elect a salvation from the love of sin. God declares to Satan that He will make His elect hate sin and him, that is, Satan, that faith-destroyer. It means that He, the almighty God, will make His elect love Him, even though in Adam we were turned against Him. He will deliver us from the hatred Satan worked in the human race. That basically is our salvation; and deliverance from the punishment we deserve; and thus freedom from all the torments of hell will be ours. That deliverance from punishment is not that which produces salvation from sin. Salvation from sin is what gives us the right to be delivered from the punishment we deserve.

These lines are written to you young people because you are confronted with more false doctrines, and temptations into sin, than we were when we were of the age which you now have. Satan is so clever and active, and he is working very hard, because he hates God so fully that he got God's Son nailed to the cross. And he is not working so very, very hard in his attempt of keeping the citizens of the Kingdom of Heaven from crossing that river of life, and strives to get them to drift away from the way they must go to enter the channel and reach that kingdom where we will have sweet communion with God, and walk in perfect love of Him and unto Him.

Having chosen His people out of every nation, tongue and tribe, our God is today gathering His people who are all across the face of this earth. And that fills Satan with fury, and moves him to come with more crafty and subtle ways, with all the inventions which we have today, and which could not be used in times past. By radio and television, by jet airplanes and the use of satellites, he can and does go swiftly around the whole earth in his attempt to make us drift by crafty, subtle false doctrines. That he does much more intensely than in years gone by, and in the land of Canaan.

What is more is the fact that today churches approve of and advocate more and more worldly things, and live more and more like the world. Satan has gotten them to "eat" the things the true church very correctly condemned in ages gone by. Not only movies and dances, but other sinful deeds are even recommended. Young People, take hold of the truth our God presents in II Corinthians 6:17 namely, "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you." Plainly the point is that if we do not heed this word, God will NOT receive us. Now turn to II Corinthians 7:1, for there we read, "Having therefore these promises, dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God." Then again in Revelation 18:4 we read, "And I heard another voice from heaven, saying, "Come out of her, my people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not her plagues."

Therefore hold on to the truth our God gave His church, and which is not only the correct and Reformed presentation of what Scripture teaches us, but is also so beautifully presented in the Heidelberg Catechism, Belgic Confession and Canons of Dordrecht. That is what Satan is fighting against, and wants us to reject.

In so many ways today the church world is beginning to look more and more like the Satanic world. And we ought to see clearly how much Satan is in many ways fighting the churches that hold on to the truth of God's word, and that insist on an holy walk of life. Remember that Satan did not come directly to Adam. The awesome truth, and very serious reality, is that he came through Eve to get into Adam's soul. Likewise today, he gets men (Adams) to leave a church that presents and maintains the truth, and a walk of life in harmony with it, by means of women (Eves) who walk in worldliness and false doctrines, which causes these men to drift

away from that entrance into the Haven of Rest. Or Satan gets women to be willing to leave a church with the truth, in order to get a husband who with fleshly joy drifts down that stream of life, and is on the way to the waterfall into Hell!

Remember that we are going to enter the channel that brings us into that Haven of Rest, or down stream with the everlasting torment of hell! It is "either . . . or" and there is nothing in between. We drift with the wind Satan is blowing, or by God's grace we seek the "city which hath foundation, whose builder and maker is God." Hebrews 11:20. We let Satan blow us to hell, or we blow him out of our lives, and with Jesus say, "Get thou behind me, Satan; thou art an offense unto me: for thou savourest not the things that be of God, but those that be of men." Matthew 16:23.

Do not add more worldly things to your lives, but fight against Satan in order to get farther and farther away from his godless, devilish and crafty ways. Bear in mind the truth presented a moment ago, that he seems to be such a charming, wonderful friend. And the wind he blows may seem so refreshing and comfortable, on a day that is hot because of temptations, and because the holy wrath of the almighty God is

sent upon the world that hates Him. Give "the more earnest heed to the things which we have heard, lest at any time we drift" on the way to hell! Hebrews 2:1.

Listen to the apostle Paul: "I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Philippians 3:14. Read also the verses from 14-21. Take a firm hold also on what Paul wrote; for we find in there the comforting truth that our citizenship is in heaven. In our King James version we do find that "our conversation is in heaven"; but the Greek word that Paul uses comes from the Greek word for city. Because we are citizens in God's kingdom by His grace, our conversation is and must be heavenly; but Paul does here give us the reason why we can have a godly conversation. He has caused us to be citizens of His kingdom, and He has enabled us to speak as such citizens.

Live that way, Young People, and do not drift along with the citizens of Satan's kingdom. Seek the Kingdom of Heaven and its righteousness. Do not drift with the world, but drive on the path on which Christ walked, and seek the Kingdom of Heaven and its righteousness in a righteous walk.
