CONVENTION SPEECH

THE CHRISTIAN SOLDIER

The theme text for this convention has been announced as II Tim. 2:3-5: "Thou therefore endure hardship, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. No man that warreth entangleth himself with the affairs of this life; that he may please him who hath chosen him to be a soldier. And if a man also strive for masteries, yet is he not crowned, except he strive lawfully."

That text uses a figure in describing what is a Christian. It is the figure of a soldier. I dare say that all of you hear news from day to day. Some of you hear it on your radios, others read the newspaper, some even watch it on network television. In the past couple years we have seen our own country involved in conflict. There has been massive fighting in Yugoslavia as well as in other parts of the world. There are soldiers called to fire their artillery, to kill with their guns. There are others who never make it back to see their loved ones. They die at the hands of their enemies. We view such fighting as a frightful thing, evidence of the great upheaval in the world wrought because of sin. It also is a sign of Christ's coming, don't forget. In that sign we Christians find our comfort. But my point here is this: Do you understand that every time you see a soldier, you are looking at a picture of yourself as a Christian? That is how the Bible speaks about you who believe. If you are a Christian, you are a soldier. And although just a figure, it is evident that the figure is a very realistic presentation of the Christian life. The Bible points us to reality and that is clear from the many, many other passages in Scripture that speak of our life of conflict, our life of battle, our life of great warfare. Do you find that to be a description of your own life? The battle of which I am speaking, the

battle of which Scripture speaks, the battle in which the Christian soldier is engaged, is as real and true to life as any warfare the world has seen. It has its hand-to-hand conflicts and its psychological warfare. It requires careful watching, and it brings fatigue at times. In this battle the Christian is under many attacks, sometimes major sieges. And this battle is ongoing. Although there may be times when the scene is peaceful in a measure, it is never longer than momentarily. It is a lifelong battle. There are times the Christian appears defeated, but he (or she) fights as victorious. And while the consequences of warfare among the nations is temporary and repairable to a degree, the consequences of this battle in which Christians are engaged are unchangeable and everlasting. Again I ask you, do you find in your own life such a battle?

There are a whole lot of Christians out there today who have a strange conception of the Christian life. They view the Christian life as life on a playground—all fun and games. I have news for you. That is not the Christian life. And I don't say that to take all joy out of Christianity. The amazing thing about the Christian life is that one can be joyful while being involved in fierce conflict. That is something Christianity provides that nothing else can—joy even in conflict. True and lasting joy doesn't come in fun and games. You will not find peace and joy while walking in sin, or cavorting with the enemy. Only the fight of faith provides the joy and peace of fellowship with God in Jesus Christ. You must understand, my brothers and sisters in Christ, that there is a huge portion of Christianity today that is not true, genuine Christianity. It passes

the test of social acceptability, it satisfies sleepy consciences; but it is not the real thing. There are thousands of men and women, even such as yourself, who go to church every Sunday and call themselves Christians. Their names are on the membership rolls of the church, they have been baptized, they are married with a Christian marriage ceremony, and they intend to be buried as Christians when they die. But there is never any spiritual fight in their life. They go along with the majority, do what is socially acceptable, maybe are even active in trying to influence the world for good; but of spiritual strife and exertion on behalf of the Scriptures, of conflict and self-denial and watchfulness and warring against principalities and powers, they know nothing at all. Such Christianity may satisfy a man's conscience, when he doesn't hear the truth of Scripture, and those who say what I am saying now are thought to be most uncharitable and unloving; but such is not the Christianity of the Bible. That is not the Christian faith established by God on the foundation of the Apostles and prophets—on the Scriptures, with Christ as the chief cornerstone. It is not the religion which produces holiness and thankfulness to God. For true Christianity is a life of warfare, and the Christian is a soldier. For the next little while, then, I intend to direct your attention to yourselves as:

CHRISTIAN SOLDIERS

For the sake of enabling you better to remember the main thoughts of this speech, and that you might know where I am going with my theme, I intend to follow an outline much like any sermon. I even have three points. I want to direct your attention to:

- I. THE DANGEROUS ENEMY
- II. THE FIERCE BATTLE
- III. THE CERTAIN OUTCOME

I. YOUR DANGEROUS ENEMY IS NOT JUST ONE, BUT THREE.

YOU UNDOUBTEDLY HAVE BEEN WARNED ABOUT THEM OFTEN IN THE PREACHING OF THE WORD— THE WORLD, THE DEVIL, AND YOUR OWN SINFUL FLESH. (LET'S CONSIDER EACH OF THEM VERY BRIEFLY, AND THEN I WANT TO MAKE A FEW CONCLUDING REMARKS ABOUT THESE 3 ENEMIES BEFORE MOVING ON TO TALK ABOUT THE FIERCE BATTLE.)

A. WE CONSIDER FIRST, THEN, THE

ENEMY WHICH IS THE WORLD.

When I speak of the world as your enemy, I am speaking of the world as the Bible does in different places, referring to the world as it stands in the service of sin. Calvin was correct when he defined the idea of this world as meaning all that is outside of God, whether in the creation around us or in us. Anything that stands in the service of sin is that which belongs to the world.

Now, I'm going to make bold to say that at no other time has the world been so dangerous for you who will live godly in Christ Jesus. I realize some would dispute that. This world doesn't seem like such a dangerous place, especially when you live in the suburbs or in a small community such a Randolph, Wisconsin or Lynden, Washington. We don't suffer physical persecution. We are not in danger of being burned at the stake or roasted in boiling oil, as were some of God's people in the past. But I still will say that this world is as dangerous a place today for the Christian, as has ever been in history. I say that because of the biblical truth that sin develops. Sin has continued to develop throughout history. Every age has had its own peculiar plague of sin and has revealed its own particular hatred toward Christ and His church. In the days of violent and physical persecution, the world slew its thousands. But I say in the light of Jesus' words and in the light of the inspired epistles, that in our day of ease and luxury and free thought and the love of pleasure and the openness of immorality, the world slays its tens of thousands. The subtle influence of the world, these days, seems to infect the very air we breath. It creeps into our midst like an angel of light, and leads multitudes of well-meaning church people captive. That same love of the world's good things, that same dread of the world's opposition—which proved fatal to men like Judas Iscariot and Demas and many others—is even more powerful today! The enormous power of self-love and self-seeking, the startling rise of a so-called tolerance toward every sin known to man, and the increasing intolerance toward the truth of Scripture, all demonstrate that we Christians have a major battle to fight against the world.

B. THE SECOND ENEMY WITH WHICH WE CONTEND IS THE DEVIL.

Now, you understand that when we talk about the devil, we enter into that which is

beyond our natural perception. The devil belongs to the realm of the unseen, the supernatural, if you will. You must not let that cause you to question the existence of the devil. The simple fact is, Christianity is thoroughly supernatural. At the very heart of our Christian faith is the declaration that Christianity is based on revelation. God tells us that there is a dimension of reality that is not visible to our natural eye, yet that has a profound influence upon our lives. To use an illustration, before the advances in the field of medicine over the past few generations, there were a multitude of viruses and microscopic particles that previous generations knew nothing about. There was an unseen world that had a profound effect upon the lives of thousands. And although that still belongs to the natural world, the same holds true with this realm of the supernatural. Paul warns us in Ephesians 6, that our battle goes beyond flesh and blood. We are wrestling against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, (those spiritual rulers which lie behind the darkness of our enemy which is the world), against spiritual wickedness (spiritual hosts of evil) in high places, (i.e., in the heavenlies)! (Eph. 6:12).

So our enemy is not only the devil, but his army, the hosts of evil. These are personal beings! Don't be deceived by the modern philosophy that makes out Satan to be just another name for the vague and indefinite power of evil in the world. There is nothing that pleases him more than when people in the church deny his very existence and call him a myth. No philosophy does more to put the church to sleep. The devil is a definite person with tremendous power! Even a superficial reading of the Bible will show you that. Not that we extol Satan in any sense of the word. You mustn't forget either that Satan is only a creature. He does not have the power of God. He is not everywhere present. He can only be in one place at one time. But, as I pointed out, he has a great army of devils doing his will. And Satan, the devil, is a creature with extraordinary gifts. He is a cunning enemy, who has a definite purpose in his works, who is able either himself or through his hosts to spy you out and to discover where you are most vulnerable to his attacks. He is ready to exploit your weakness and bring about your downfall. Don't underestimate the power of Satan! His name is devil, the liar, who seeks to overthrow you. He appears not as the prince of darkness that he is, but as an angel of light. He can be most subtle and sophisticated in his deceptiveness. The Apostle Peter

speaks of him clearly as our enemy, when he writes in I Peter 5:8: "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion—notice that, as a roaring lion—walking about, seeking". seeking what, to draw a few more people around his cage in the zoo? Seeking what, to simply play with you, and maybe leave a few fang marks? Oh no. Listen. "Seeking whom he may devour!" Do you realize the seriousness of this warfare, young Christian? To devour the work of God in you, that is the purpose of the devil. He would confuse your spiritual thinking; he would extinguish the fire of your love for God by the pleasures of this life and the things of this world; he would deprive you of your heavenly inheritance. He is an extremely dangerous enemy!

C. THE THIRD ENEMY, THOUGH NOT ANY LESS AN ENEMY THAN THE OTHER TWO, IS OUR OWN SINFUL FLESH.

Our own sinful flesh is a very old enemy, one well-tested. It has survived even from the years of Adam and Eve, wearing itself deeper and deeper into our human natures. And from the flesh comes all kinds of evil works. And don't make the big mistake of thinking that the works of the flesh are only physical sins. In Galatians 5, it is true, Paul speaks of the works of the flesh as including adultery and fornication and murder and drunkenness, and the like. But he also includes envy and hatred and strife. Do you have any idea how destructive envy is to you? Are you conscious of how destructive it is for you to carry around bitterness in your heart? or hatred? That stuff is of that enemy that would drag you down to hell, the old man of sin in you. And for you who love God, who long to be servants of Jesus Christ, you are engaged in an ongoing struggle with your own inclination to evil. Jesus Himself calls us to battle with this enemy, when He says, "Watch and pray; the spirit may be willing, but the flesh is weak."

D. THOSE 3 ENEMIES, THE WORLD, THE DEVIL AND YOUR OWN SINFUL FLESH, ARE FORMIDABLE ENEMIES.

It is impossible to say which of the three does the most harm to us spiritually —the devil himself, and that would include his hosts; the world of sin and unbelief; or our own sinful flesh. I urge you not to underestimate the strength and deceptive capabilities of any one of them. But then, neither must you forget that any two or all

three often work hand in hand as allies against you. And taken together they form an enemy that is a very powerful host.

You stand in the strength of youth. You have made it past the great battles of high school with all its peer pressure, many of you have made confession of faith, and by God's grace have received the victory through many battles. But don't miscalculate and underestimate the difficulty of the battles yet before you. I dare say, the past few years for you have been the most dangerous years from the viewpoint of succumbing to the enemy. I think that is evident from Scripture too. The teenage years are the most dangerous as far as succumbing to the enemy. We learn that from the book of Daniel, where particular warning is given to the youth of the church—comfort too, in the deliverance that is ours in Christ. But Daniel and his 3 friends, together with the other princes of Israel, were taken captive in their early teenage years, exactly because those are the years when a person is most susceptible to being swayed and captured by the enemy. There is also that phrase that we sing from the Psalms, Psalm 25, "sins of youth remember not." That also implies that in our youth we are particularly susceptible to being wounded by the enemy. And although you may already have seen the heat of the battle in your high school years, many of you are still under heavy attack. And I speak to you as one who has experienced many of those battles. I was wounded in some of those battles of youth. I still carry some scars, as probably do some of you. But there is something else you must know: There are other battles that I face today that are just as fierce as those I faced 10 to 20 years ago. You must know that too. The warfare of the Christian is a lifelong warfare and you have yet to see many battles

II. BEING A CHRISTIAN MEANS THAT YOU ENTER THE FIERCE BATTLE AGAINST THOSE ENEMIES.

A. WHERE THERE IS GRACE, WHERE THERE IS TRUE FAITH, THE CHRISTIAN IS A SOLDIER.

This battle allows no times of truce with the enemy. This battle must be fought on Sundays as well as weekdays, in private as well as public, at home as well as outside the home, in the management of thoughts as well as outward actions. The enemies against which we fight

don't take vacations. So long as we live on this earth, we must remember we are on enemy territory. All true saints are soldiers. Where those who have the name Christian are not soldiers, there is religious apathy, stagnation, deadness and indifference. And I will be frank with you: I see far too much of such stagnation and indifference in the churches. May you not be characterized by such deadness. One of the great blessings of these conventions is the opportunity to have our spiritual fervor stoked up a little bit. And in connection with this speech, I pray that the Spirit applies it in such a way that you go forth to fight with renewed vigor. You are the church. I say to the young people, You are the church of the future. You young adults are the church. You who have made confession of your faith, who have made known to the church that you are soldiers in the conflict—you are now the church. And you soon become the most prominent members of the church—the husbands and wives—some of you; parents; godly women, mothers and keepers of our homes; assistants to these men who will soon be the officers—ministers and elders and deacons; generals and captains in the army of God. Even you who will play seemingly small roles, the privates, are the backbone of the army. Don't be indifferent about this battle of faith! Any soldier experienced in warfare will tell you, indifference is death. There is no room for spiritual stagnation. And where that is seen in the churches, it must be rooted out. Not only by sound preaching and faithful instruction, even Christian discipline when necessary; but it must be rooted out by replacing those who are apathetic with you who are ready to go forth in the strength of Christ and by His Spirit, ready to wage war against the onslaughts of the world, the devil and your own sinful flesh.

B. HOW DO YOU PREPARE FOR THE BATTLE?

A double answer is found in Ephesians 6:10—13. First, "Be strong in the Lord, and in the power of his might;" and secondly, "Put on the whole armor of God"—not part of it, not merely one or two pieces, but the whole armor of God. In the first place, ours must be the fight of faith. That is what it is to be strong in the Lord, and in the power of his might. From this point of view the Christian warfare is unlike any conflicts of this world. It does not depend upon human strength, nor a quick eye and coordinated reflexes. It is not some kind of nintendo game. It isn't fought with earthly weapons, but spiritual.

Faith, a personal union with Christ, is the heart of the Christian soldier's character. You must see Jesus, and cling to Him. If you only see your own many sins, your weak heart, the many temptations you face, the fury of the devil, then you might well despair. But you must see Jesus, a mighty Savior, a sympathizing Savior, an interceding Savior, your Savior. Living faith in Christ's presence and a readiness to follow Him is the secret of the Christian soldier fighting successfully. And don't forget, faith will ebb and flow in your life. It does in mine. At one time you will be stronger than another. And according to the measure of your faith, you will fight in strength or suffer; you will come off triumphant, or lose a battle. That is why you and I must constantly seek to strengthen our faith, also praying fervently for the grace of the Holy Spirit. It is the shield of faith that quenches all the fiery darts of the wicked one. Nothing will enable you to bear the fatigue of struggling and wrestling against your threefold enemy as will the indwelling confidence that Christ is on your side and your success, even through difficulty, is sure. Abide in Christ; draw closer to Him. Let your daily prayer be that of the disciples (Luke 17:5), "Lord, increase our faith." But secondly, the Apostle writes, "Put on the whole armor of God." Now, I don't have time to describe this armor in any detail. This armor is described in verses 14-17 of Ephesians 6. We need every part of it, without exception. But what I would have you notice is that all the parts of this armor are concentrated in the Word of God. A religion without doctrine is what many are fond of talking about today. That sounds fine at first. Let's make Christianity entirely practical; remove all emphasis on doctrine. But you see, when you sit down and examine that way of thinking, it is simply an impossibility. You might just as well talk about a body without a skeletal or muscular system. No man will ever enter into the battle of faith, unless he believes something. Faith must lay hold of Christ He as reveals Himself in the Scriptures. No one ever fights earnestly against the world, the devil and the flesh, unless he has first engraven upon his heart and in his head certain principles to which he is committed and which he cannot give up. I trust that you have reached the age where the truth of Scripture is all starting to fall into place. The last few years of Catechism you put in your time—most of you—not all that enthused about what you were learning. I think you are at the point now, and you will find that much more in the future, that you begin to appreciate what you have learned. You are equipped to fight the

battle of faith. But you need to continue to grow, to take that armor to yourself until you are completely covered.

III. THE WONDERFUL THING ABOUT YOUR BATTLE, MY CHRISTIAN FRIENDS, IS THAT YOURS IS THE VICTORY IN CHRIST JESUS.

A. DO YOU KNOW THIS BATTLE? ARE YOU GAINING EXPERIENCE IN THE WARFARE OF THE CHRISTIAN LIFE?

If your answer is "yes," you have something for which you may thank God. You may take comfort about your battle situation For you have evidence even in yourself that God is at work. You and I fight under the leadership of Christ, the Conqueror of perfect wisdom and almighty power. He is the Captain of our salvation. He never makes any useless movements, never errs in judgment, never commits any mistake. The humblest servant in His army is not forgotten; the weakest is cared for and kept unto salvation. No soldiers of Christ are ever lost, left dead on the battlefield.

Moreover, your fight as a Christian soldier works for your own good, your own joy. Such a fight will bring out the best in you. Christian warfare promotes humility and charity; it lessens self-seeking and worldmindedness; it gives one to see the glory of serving the Savior. If you talk to an elderly saint, you will not find one who regrets fighting Christ's battles against sin, the world and the devil. What you will find in your elderly brothers and sisters is sorrow over one thing: They failed to put their whole being into that battle earlier, and experience the joy of serving Christ from their early youth. May you seize the opportunity now, and enter the battle with renewed zeal. And the battle ends, you may be sure, with a glorious reward for all you who fight in it. It is a reward of grace, the crown of glory that never fades. Remember, you only see part of the battle yet. You see the struggle, and there are more to come. But the victory, though won, is yet to be revealed to you.

B. SOME OF YOU HAVE ALREADY BEEN AND WILL BE WOUNDED.

Some of you will carry the scars of your wounds into eternity. But God does not forsake His wounded soldiers. There is healing in the blood of Jesus. And even for you who are wounded and trapped by enemy forces, there is a medi-

cal helicopter dropping into enemy territory to rescue you. The gospel provides for you the way out. The work of God is mighty. And the angels of God surround you, ready to deliver you into complete salvation at the very instant God gives the command. And Christ Himself never leaves you nor forsakes you, abiding in you by the Holy Spirit. Many are His promises to you. They shall be fulfilled. Listen to His Word (Isaiah 43:2):

“When thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee: when thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee.” The God of peace shall bruise Satan under your feet shortly. “He which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ” (Phil. 1:6).

PROTESTANT REFORMED SCHOOLS A MATTER OF CONFESSION

That we, being members of the Protestant Reformed Churches, insist on our own Christian Schools is beyond doubt. In this brief article it is my goal to show why this is indeed the case. I would like to do this by showing that the existence of our own Protestant Reformed Christian schools is a matter of confession.

This is our confession formally in Lord's Day 38 of the Heidelberg Catechism, which states that God requires by the fourth commandment that “the ministry of the gospel and the - schools be maintained...” Naturally, as a result of this confession, we do indeed maintain our Christian schools as a ministry. It is also our confession that our Christian Schools are maintained by parents rather than the church. This is because God has given the responsibility of child-rearing to the parent. Deuteronomy 6:6,7.

We also confess that God has given our children to us, not to the state or society in general. Therefore, we do not send our children to the public school where it is unlawful to mention the name of God or Christ but as a curse. We do not send them to the public school where all glory is given to man, the creature, rather than God, the Creator. Because of this confession, we take active control over the teaching of our children in the Christian school. We make sure that the teachers who lead our children into all truth fear

God and teach according to His word, the sacred Scriptures. We are diligent to uphold the authority of the teacher in our homes, in the presence of our children. As a result, our children know that when they go to school, the teacher is our representative.

It is also our confession that Protestant Reformed Christian Schools are the best means to instruct our covenant children. Because we believe that the doctrines taught by our Protestant Reformed Churches are true, we insist that the schools which our children attend will teach those same doctrines. Only if our children attend Protestant Reformed schools, can we rest assured that they will not be taught the wicked doctrines of evolution, common grace, or feminism. As we see more and more churches (along with their schools) fall away from the truth of God's word, the necessity of schools that are distinctly Protestant Reformed will become more and more apparent.

We have much to be thankful for. Our parents have worked hard to give us our Christian Schools. God has been pleased to use them as means to raise up His covenant children in His grace. Therefore, let us stand together to ensure that this means of His grace continues through generations to come.

THE THIRD COMMANDMENT

The third commandment states, "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain, for He shalt not hold him guiltless that taketh His name in vain." In reading this commandment, there are two things which are striking. First, the personal aspect of the command when the Lord is called "Thy God." And second, the antithetical nature of this command in the way in which God presents the command to us.

The reason why God presents this third commandment to us antithetically lies in the very nature of God Himself. He is holy. And, His name, unlike ourselves, is a revelation of Himself. All of the names we read in Scripture which are attributed to God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit or as God Triune are revelations of the very essence of God Himself. Do you want to know who God is? Then know the Names of the Lord. There are many human expressions in Scripture God uses to reveal to us the Name of the Lord because there is no one word that can describe His infinite being of holiness.

However, there seems to be a paradox in this command of Jehovah. How can the Holy One of Israel in whom is no sin, come to us who are sinful and be our God personally? Holiness is the rejection of all that which is evil. It finds sin repugnant. And what fellowship can light have with darkness? Yet in this commandment the Lord calls Himself "Thy God." How can this be? The answer lies in the nature of God Himself. He is a covenant God.

God is Triune: within the Trinity the three Persons of God have perfect communication. When God created man, He established that covenant relation with man. But man broke that bond of friendship when he sinned. He no longer was the friend of God, but became His enemy and man's love for God turned to hatred. But God, Who is merciful, did not abandon man; rather He redeemed him through Jesus Christ.

Jesus Christ, the God-Man, became the Mediator of God's covenant. And through Jesus Christ, God has chosen unto Himself a people to be His possession, His Church. Out of love for His Church God appointed Jesus Christ to be their Redeemer. And out of love for His Father and for the church universal God had given Him, Jesus willingly died and shed His blood for His people for the forgiveness of their sins. There was no other way. The holiness of God required this. The soul that sinneth must die. And Jesus willingly did this for us out of love. No greater love hath a man than that he lay down his life for his friend.

Now we are the friends of God, through Jesus Christ. We have been clothed with the righteousness of Christ. We are made holy in the sight of God. Now the Holy God of heaven and earth sees us through Christ as holy. Wow! It is possible for God to say that He is our God.

As friends of God, how are we to behave ourselves? Jesus says that if we are His friends we are to love God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength. And if we love God we are to obey and do His commandments.

Who among us would even consider taking the name of a good friend and dragging it in the dirt? No, rather we speak highly of our friend to others. That is the essence of friendship. How much more then should we highly exalt the Name of our God? But when we take God's Name in vain, that is to make it a common thing among men by swearing or irreverently swearing oaths, we drag down God's Name and His holiness. Then we do not demonstrate to others and ourselves that we are the friends of God. Our bond of friendship and faith becomes strained.

You see, faith is not only knowledge of the Word, but also confidence. And the confidence of faith comes only by being doers of the Word and not just hearers only. Therefore, we must strive

with all of our heart, soul, mind, and strength to do this Word of God, not to take His Name in vain. Then we will grow in faith and become more confident that yes, we are the friends of God through Jesus Christ.

And to those who do not demonstrate their

love to God and show that they are not the friends of God, but rather His enemies, the Lord will not hold them guiltless. The cross of Jesus Christ is not for him. This is therefore the anti-theological nature of the third commandment. Are you the friend of God?

MORMONISM: WHY IS IT A CULT?

Mormonism is considered to be one of the four major cults. But what makes it a cult? On the surface it seems that these are pretty valid religions and that they could be considered Christian. But when you look deeper you see how very far from Christianity they really are. Cults disagree with the fundamental doctrines of the Christian faith, such as salvation by grace alone. They also claim to have another authority other than the Bible (e.g. the Book of Mormon.) Cults consider theirs to be the only true religion, and all others are false. Lastly, the cults believe that they have a central role in the end times. As you read this it will become plain to you why Mormonism is a cult.

Mormonism is considered to be one of the fastest growing cults in the world. In 1983 they claimed to have over 5.1 million members world wide. We can assume that that number has increased substantially over the last nine years. Although today the Mormon church is prosperous, 150 years ago, this was not the case. The founder of this new "American" religion was Joseph Smith, a resident of Palmyra, New York. According to Joseph, at the age of 14 he received a vision from "two personages" which told him that all other religions were false and that he was the one chosen to become the prophet of the Lord. He met often with a spirit named Moroni, the son of the prophet and author of most of the Book of Mormon. Over the next several years

Moroni supplied Joseph with the golden plates on which the Book of Mormon was written, and a set of huge spectacles, the Urim and Thummim, to translate them with. The Book of Mormon was written in what Joseph described as "reformed Egyptian." This language is refuted by scholars world wide. Joseph soon obtained a rather large gathering of followers, which he moved to Navoo, Illinois. Then in 1844, Joseph entered "martyrdom" when a group of lawless men hung him.

The leadership then fell on Brigham Young, one of Joseph Smith's closest followers. He moved the people out to Salt Lake City, Utah and built a community there. The Mormons were resented by many people in America. One of the main reasons was that the Mormons are communal. And, to their neighbors' dismay, they were very successful. That is one reason they were persecuted when they started as a religious group.

Mormonism has two sacred texts which are, according to them, God inspired. The first is the King James Version of the Bible. We believe that the Bible is God given, and that the KJV is one of the best translations. But the Mormons have a sequel to the Bible, the Book of Mormon. It is very confusing and difficult to understand. Basically the book is about a tribe of Israelites that leave Israel before Christ's birth. This tribe journeyed to the place we would call North and

South America. Over many years, two tribes were formed: the Jaredites and the Nephites. The Jaredites were cursed and destroyed by God, leaving the Nephites. The Lamanites (or to use modern terms, the Indians) broke away from the Nephites and later destroyed the peace loving Nephites. Mormon wrote down all that had happened and abridged the material before he died. His son Moroni, the last Nephite, hid the golden tablets on which this history is written until Joseph Smith was able to retrieve them.

As I noted before, the Book of Mormon was written in reformed Egyptian. Amazingly, Joseph Smith is the only person alive to have seen this new ancient language. Not one other article of literature has ever been found with this type of writing on it. So it is doubtful that Joseph was telling the truth about this so called language. This also makes the authenticity of the Book of Mormon very doubtful.

There are two other texts that Mormons consider to be sacred texts. They are: The Pearl of Great Price, and Doctrine and Covenants. These are even more difficult to understand than the Book of Mormon and it seems that not as much emphasis is placed on these as is on the Book of Mormon.

Mormons have a very different theology from ours when it comes to the relationship between God and man. It can be summed up in a very few words. What man is, God once was. What God is, man must strive to become. This is not the only startling contradiction. According to the Mormons, there are many gods! If you are a good Mormon all of your life, you will become a god over some world in the universe! Not only will we be gods, but we will have many wives which will bear us spirit-children. These spirit-children then are put into bodies of the babies born of Mormon parents.

Our doctrine of the virgin birth is different than the Mormons. In Luke 1:35a we read, "And the angel answered and said unto her, 'The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee...'" Yet the Mormons hold to the belief that God the Father came down to Mary and caused her to conceive Jesus. They change the wonderful miracle of the virgin birth to the filthy pagan belief of the

Greeks and Romans which had lustful gods going after the women of the earth. In Luke 1:35 it clearly says that "the Holy Ghost shall come upon thee..." I don't know where the Mormons get the idea of the Father coming down to conceive Jesus.

The Mormons also hold the belief that the Holy Ghost is an "it." The Holy Ghost is non-gender, He is neuter. The Holy Ghost is nothing more than the actions of God on this earth. This teaching rips apart the doctrine of the Trinity. For if the Holy Ghost is nothing more than God's actions, he can't be a part of God. Yet, strangely, the Mormons say they hold to the doctrine of the Trinity. Clearly, it is obvious that they do not.

The Mormons concept of heaven is also very unique. Mormons say that there are three places where men's souls will go. The lowest is hell, the place where unbelievers go when they die. The second level is midway between heaven and hell. The people that believed in God, but didn't hold to Mormonism will come to this place. The people in this level have no chance of becoming "gods" of other worlds. The final and most glorious stage is that of heaven itself where the very perfect that were on earth become gods and the others live a life of bliss and happiness until they too can merit divinity themselves.

In closing I would like to point out one thing that I'm sure Joseph Smith didn't remember or didn't care about. That is the verse in Rev. 22:18 where the Holy Ghost, through John says, "For I testify unto every man that heareth the words of the prophecy of this book, if any man shall add unto these things, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this book."
